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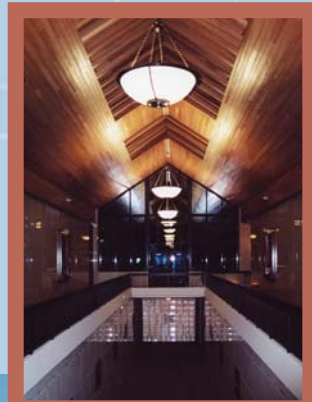
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INNOVATIVE DESIGNS PUT THE SPOTLIGHT ON SERVICE

ALBANY, NY

Constructed into a hillside, the new community mausoleum for the Albany Diocesan Cemeteries shows off an interior open balcony with four large carved wood icon panels commemorating the North American Saints. The architectural firms of Schoepfer Architects of Syracuse, NY, in conjunction with Cataldo, Waters, and Griffith of Schenectady, NY, designed the mausoleum.



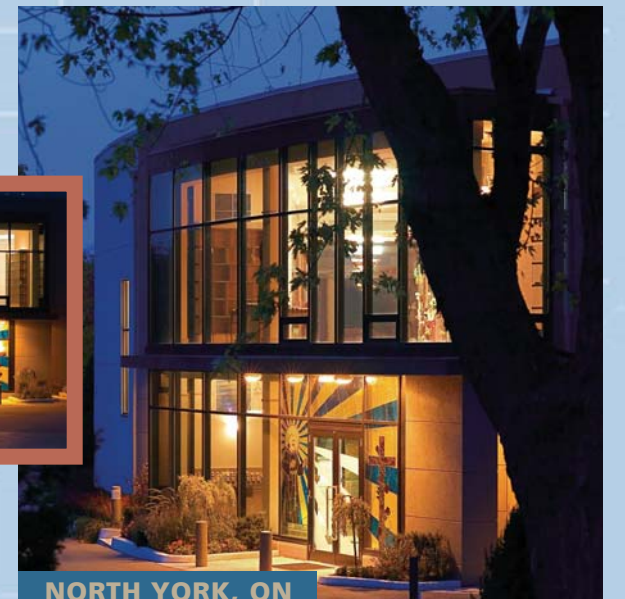
BRONX, NY

The Woodlawn Garden Conservatory mausoleum contains 2,326 casket spaces and 200 niche spaces. Designed by J. Stuart Todd, Architects of Dallas, TX, this mausoleum features three large courtyards covered by expansive skylights and clerestory windows to provide an abundance of natural light to shine on the greenery and features, which include a life-size marble angel and fountain.



NORTH YORK, ON

In early 2004, the Padre Pio Mausoleum has been completed through in depth collaboration between owner, Don Caunter, Architects of Toronto, ON, and CMC. This original 1970 exterior mausoleum was transformed into a new two storey 1,164 crypts modern day building. Now totally enclosed, this new mausoleum allows families to continue the memorialization of future heritage in the comfort of a heated and air conditioned environment for years to come.



PHOENIX, AZ

The new Resurrection Mausoleum presents a stunning depiction of the Resurrection of Christ extending over two floor levels by the use of bronze crypt shutters and glass panels in the floor to allow an uninterrupted view. This project of 1,703 casket spaces was constructed for the Diocese of Phoenix and was conceived in conjunction with the architectural firm of J. Stuart Todd, Architects of Dallas, TX, and CMC.



RIVERSIDE CEMETERY



CMC recently designed and installed a new complete cremation garden at Riverside Cemetery located in Lindsay, Ontario.

Today's consumer is looking for value and various interment options, while creating a serene atmosphere, when memorializing a life once lived.

This creative use of interment options allows families to have several choices in location and atmosphere, with pricing to accommodate any budget.

This unique garden focuses on a central twin peak columbarium, four raised curved units, two entrance feature obelisks and private family estate units, for a total of 380 niches.
